## Are WV's Youngest Children Getting

 the High-Quality Childcare They Need?- About half of WV children under six ( 59,366 kids) are living in low-income families. Most of them are not getting the quality early child development programs they need. (See chart at right)
- Chances are these kids will start school behind and may never catch up.
- For example, higher-income parents speak much more to their children, and, as a result, the children hear 30 million more words by age 3 than children from low-income households. There is a direct connection between the vocabulary that children have in the early years and their ability to read at third grade, and that is a direct predictor of high school graduation as well.
- That's why high-quality early child development programs are the key to helping low-income kids overcome this readiness gap.


Nobel Prize-Winning Economist James Heckman has found that investments in our youngest children have dramatically higher returns than at any other age.

## Foreword

The Annie E. Casey Foundation launched the KIDS COUNT initiative in 1989. The nationwide project was founded on the notion that the more the public and policymakers know about the status and needs of children the greater the chance those needs would be addressed.

The West Virginia KIDS COUNT project was first funded in 1991 and is one of 50 similar projects throughout the United States. The 2013 KIDS COUNT Data Book is the 22nd annual profile of West Virginia's children. To compile this Data Book, KIDS COUNT pulls together the best available data to measure the well-being of children in West Virginia.

This year, the KIDS COUNT Data Book measures 12 indicators of child wellbeing and 17 background facts. Also included are statewide changes in the indicators and background facts as well as the county-level data. The county profiles are available online at www.wvkidscount. org and through the Casey Foundation's data center at datacenter.kidscount.org.

One of the most important ways the Data Book can be used is as a tool for selecting children's issues that need our attention. Last year, instead of a traditional long-form essay about a key policy issue, we produced a short, compelling "infographic" to tell the story of teen pregnancy in West Virginia. The teen pregnancy data snapshot took a groundbreaking look at the problems caused by teens getting pregnant. It outlined the solutions for reducing the state's alarming teen pregnancy rate, particularly in the southern part of the state. Media coverage of the infographic shattered KIDS COUNT's previous records, earning 112 stories and 22 editorials addressing the urgent need to reduce the number of teens having babies. Public interest in the teen pregnancy report was so high that KIDS COUNT's Executive Director Margie Hale was invited to be among the first child advo-
cates to testify at the inaugural meeting of the West Virginia Senate's Select Committee on Child Poverty.

In June of 2013 KIDS COUNT issued another similarly well-covered infographic on the third grade reading proficiency crisis in West Virginia. Building on the success of those first two data snapshots, we have included another pull-out infographic in this 2013 Data Book. It is called The Big Payoff: Why We Should Be (But Aren 't) Investing the Most in WV's Youngest Kids. (See pull-out on page 1.)


The infographic has also been designed to easily pull out and post on a bulletin board or share with others who are working to improve and expand early child development programs in West Virginia. ## Key Indicators:

## BIRTHS TO MOTHERS WITH LESS THAN A 12TH GRADE EDUCATION (\%)

The percentage of all births to mothers with less than a 12th grade education. This indicator is based on a three-year total ending in 2011. The number of births to mothers with less than a 12 th grade education is divided by the total number of births to mothers with known education. WV Department of Health and Human Resources, Health Statistics Center. The national percent is based on years 2008-2010.

## BIRTHS TO UNMARRIED TEENS AGES

 10-19 (\%)The percentage of all live births to unmarried teens ages 10-19. At a national level, the percentage represents live births that are to unmarried teens under 20 years of age. This indicator is based on a three-year total ending in 2011. The numerator is the number of births to unmarried teens ages 10-19; the denominator is the total number of births. The base population for this indicator is births to all mothers, regardless of age. National data are based on years 2009-2011. WV Department of Health and Human Resources, Health Statistics Center.

## CHILD ABUSE/NEGLECT (rate per 1,000

 children)The number of children found to be victims of abuse or neglect per 1,000 children under age 18. The rate is based on an average of victims for three years ending in 2012. WV Department of Health and Human Resources, Bureau for Children and Families. The national rate is from Child Maltreatment 2011, Child Victims, Chapter 3: Children, page 32. Population data are from the Population Reference Bureau.

CHILD DEATH (rate ages 1-14 per 100,000 children)
The number of deaths due to all causes of children between the ages of 1-14 years, per 100,000 children. This variable is a rate per 100,000 children based on a five-year total ending in 2011. The national rate is based on

2007-2011 data. WV Department of Health and Human Resources, Health Statistics Center.

## CHILDREN APPROVED FOR FREE OR REDUCED-PRICE SCHOOL MEALS (\%)

The percent of all enrolled children in grades K-12 who applied and were approved for free or reduced-price school meals. This indicator is used as a measure of the percent of poor and near-poor children in West Virginia. Children whose parents' income is below $130 \%$ of poverty are eligible for free meals; reduced-price meals are available for children whose parents' income is between $130 \%$ and $185 \%$ of poverty. At a county and state level, this variable is a percentage based on 2005 and 2012 data. The numerator is the number of submitted and approved applications for free or reduced-price school meals in grades K-12; the denominator is the total student enrollment in grades K-12. WV Department of Education, Office of Child Nutrition, Percentage of Needy Students. Claim date October 1, 2012. National 2012 data are from The Food Research and Action Center, West Virginia page 1, www.frac.org.

## CHILDREN IN POVERTY (\%)

The percentage of children in poverty is the share of children under age 18 who live in families with incomes below the U.S. poverty threshold as defined by the U.S. Census Bureau, 2011. U.S. Census Bureau, Small Area Income and Poverty Estimates program.

## FOUR YEAR OLDS ENROLLED IN PRE-KINDERGARTEN (\%)

The percent of four year olds who are enrolled in pre-kindergarten. This background fact uses the number of 4 year olds based on second month enrollment and a September 1 calculation date in the school year 2012-13. This does not include children who entered at 5 years or 3 year olds with special needs. The denominator is the 2012 estimate of the four-year-old population prepared by the Population Reference Bureau.

NOTE: The Department of Education's formula for calculating pre-k enrollment is different-it compares the 5 year old
kindergarten enrollment with the previous year's 4 year old pre-k enrollment. We were planning to use this formula but were unable to get the 2005 baseline data from the Department of Education.
In 2011 this indicator was added to the list of 12 used to calculate county composite rank. It replaced the Head Start indicator, which is now in ECD facts.

## HIGH SCHOOL DROPOUTS (\%)

The percentage of students in grades 7-12 who leave a public school before graduation without transferring to another school. It is based on a three-year average ending in 201213. This percent is calculated by dividing the number of dropouts by the sum of 12 th grade graduates and 7th -12 th grade dropouts. West Virginia Department of Education.

## INFANT MORTALITY (rate per 1,000 live births)

The number of deaths of infants under one year of age per 1,000 live births. The rate is based on a five-year total ending in 2011. The national rate is based on 2007-2011 data. West Virginia Department of Health and Human Resources, Health Statistics Center.

## LOW BIRTH-WEIGHT BABIES (\%)

The percent of live births weighing less than 2,500 grams ( 5.5 pounds). Based on a threeyear average ending in 2011. WV Department of Health and Human Resources, Health Statistics Center. National data are based on years 2009-2011.

TEEN BIRTH AGES 15-19 (rate per 1,000 females)
The number of live births to mothers ages $15-19$ per 1,000 females ages $15-19$. The rate is based on three years of data ending in 2011. WV Department of Health and Human Resources, Health Statistics Center. National data are based on years 2009-2011.

TEEN INJURY DEATH AGES 15-19 (rate per 100,000 teens)
The number of deaths from accidental, homicide, suicide and undetermined injuries to
teens ages $15-19$ per 100,000 teens based on five years of data ending in 2011. WV Department of Health and Human Resources, Health Statistics Center. National data are from 2010.

## FAMILIES WITH RELATED CHILDREN WHO RECEIVE CASH ASSISTANCE (\%)

The percentage of families with related children who receive public assistance under the Temporary Aid to Needy Families (TANF) program. The total of TANF cases is divided by the number of families with related children under 18 years of age. Families with related children are comprised of married couples with related children, female heads with related children, and male heads with related children. WV Department of Health and Human Resources, Bureau for Finance, Office of Accountability and Management Reporting. TANF - Cases, Individuals, and Expenditures, State Fiscal Year 2013. The total number of families with children under 18 is from the Population Reference Bureau and is 2010 data. In recent years we have used 2000 data for the number of families with children. The 2010 data are more current but may not provide an accurate picture due to the margin of error. According to our data, the total number of families with children in 2000 was 213,070; the total in 2010 was 214,937 .

## MINORITY CHILDREN UNDER 18 (\%)

The percentage of the population under age 18 that is identified as minority. Population Reference Bureau. 2012.

## MINORITY POPULATION (\%)

The percentage of the total population that is identified as minority. Population Reference Bureau. 2012.

## POPULATION (total)

The total population as reported by the U.S. Census Bureau. 2012.

## POPULATION UNDER AGE 18 (total)

The total population under age 18 as reported by the U.S. Census Bureau. 2012.

POPULATION UNDER AGE 18 (\%)
The percentage of the total population under age 18. Population Reference Bureau. 2012.

## ACDS GRADUATE FAMILY CHILDCARE

 PROVIDERS (\%)The percent of all family childcare providers who are ACDS (Apprenticeship for Child Development Specialist program) graduates. These are all graduates from 2001 to October 2013. ACDS State Coordinator, River Valley Child Development Services, October 2013.

## Childcare WORKERS WITH NO FORMAL TRAINING IN CARING FOR CHILDREN (\%)

This is the percent of all childcare workers enrolled in the state's training register system called STARS Career Pathway who have no training in caring for children. All workers enrolled in Levels I and II of the Career Pathway fit this criteria. Level I requires either being enrolled in high school or in a GED preparation class and Level II requires a high school diploma or equivalent and 0 to 1 years experience. WV Early Childhood Training Connections and Resources, River Valley Child Development Services, Huntington WV. 10/25/2013.
UNDER AGE SIX (total)
The number of children under age six in West Virginia. Population Reference Bureau. 2012.

## CHILDREN UNDER AGE SIX WITH ALL AVAILABLE PARENTS IN THE LABOR FORCE (\%)

The percent of children under age 6 who live in families with all available parents in the labor force. The number of children with both parents in the labor force, the number of children who live with their father only and he is in the labor force, and children who live with their mother only and she is in the labor force are added together to get the number of children with all available parents in the labor force. The purpose of the indicator is to determine how many children are in some form of
childcare. The margins of error are very large for nearly all counties for child population. Population Reference Bureau. 2012.

## FAMILY CHILDCARE FACILITIES (total)

The number of family childcare facilities that are regulated by the Division of Early Care and Education, WV Department of Health and Human Resources. Point in time October 2013.

## FOURTH GRADERS WHO SCORED BELOW PROFICIENT IN READING AND LANGUAGE ARTS (\%)

Students in grades three through eight and in grade ten take the West Virginia Educational Standards Test (WESTest 2). The WESTest 2 is an assessment that measures student achievement of the West Virginia Content Standards and Objectives. The content area used here is reading/language arts (RLA). Student performance is compared to WV academic standards, not a national sample of students. The RLA tests are given in the spring and while we are interested in reading ability by the end of third grade we want to follow the national KIDS COUNT Data Book definition by using 4th grade reading scores. National tests are not given in the third grade.
Assessment Data - School Year 2012-13. WV Department of Education. In 2011 this indicator was added to the list of 12 used to calculate county composite rank. It replaced the Head Start indicator, which is now in ECD facts.

## HEAD START ELIGIBLE CHILDREN SERVED AGES 3-4 (\%)

The percentage of all eligible children 3-4 years old is based on the number of funded positions in Head Start. The percent eligible is calculated using the number of children under age 5 in poverty and is from the Population Reference Bureau. West Virginia Head Start State Collaboration Project. FY 2012-13.

## LICENSED CHILDCARE CENTERS (total)

The number of licensed childcare centers in West Virginia and includes licensed Head Start programs that provide childcare services. West

Virginia Department of Health and Human Resources, Division of Early Care and Education. Point in time October 2013.

## LICENSED CHILDCARE CENTERS PARTICIPATING IN QUALITY TIER PROGRAMS (\%)

The percent of childcare centers that are either accredited by the National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC), or participating in the West Virginia Department of Health and Human Resources Tier II reimbursement program. West Virginia Department of Health and Human Resources, Division of Early Care and Education. Point in time October 2013.

## MEDICAID ENROLLED CHILDREN UNDER 5 WHO RECEIVE DENTAL CARE (\%)

The percent of children under age 5 who are enrolled in Medicaid and have received dental care during one state fiscal year. West Virginia Department of Health and Human Resources, Bureau for Medical Services, July 1, 2012 through June 30, 2013.

## REGISTERED FAMILY CHILDCARE HOMES (total)

The number of registered family childcare homes in West Virginia. West Virginia Department of Health and Human Resources, Division of Early Care and Education. Point in time October 2013.

## Notes

The 12 measures used in the WV KIDS COUNT Data Book do not capture the full range of conditions shaping children's lives, but they do reflect a wide range of factors such as health and income; they reflect experiences across a range of developmental stages; and they permit comparisons because they are consistent across counties and over time. The West Virginia measures were adopted based on the National KIDS COUNT Data Book measures.

Most of the indicators and background facts are expressed as percentages or rates. Background facts presented as actual numbers
include: total population, total population under age 18 , children under age 6 , number registered family childcare homes, number family childcare facilities, and number licensed childcare centers.

Other background facts include the percent children under age 6 who live in families with parents in the work force; percent Family Childcare Providers who are ACDS graduates; percent of NAEYC accredited childcare centers; percent of fourth graders who scored below proficient in reading; percent Medicaidenrolled children under 5 who receive dental care; and the percent of Tier II family childcare providers.

A composite county rank is derived by averaging the 12 indicator ranks. This is done to give each indicator equal weight. The average ranks are sorted from 1 (best) to 55 (worst). All rate/ percent and percent changes are rounded to the nearest tenth of a percent. ' NC ' indicates there was no change between the base and current rate. 'NA' indicates that data were not available. 'NM' (no measure) is used when the base data are zero, and the most current data are any value above zero because a percent change from zero cannot be calculated. When the base data are any value above zero and the most current data are zero, the percent change shown is always 100 percent.
